School House

School House is the oldest building on the College campus. In 1870 the College acquired a flint cottage, then known as 'Larkfield' and the foundation stone for the present School House was laid in the same year.



'Larkfield' became the home of the headmaster in the early days with the classrooms and dormitories next door in the new building occupied by boarding male pupils.

With the introduction of full co-education in 1996, it was decided to make School a girls-only boarding house. For a brief time, between September 1998 and summer 1999, the house was home to both boys and girls.
