Discovering some old trophies in a corner of the office I thought it would be nice to present some silverware to deserving individuals on a termly basis. As you have seen, **Brian Tong's** excellent start at the College earned him the academic prize, but the following prizes were also awarded in recognition of contribution to the house this term:

Sportsman of the term was awarded to **George Pepper.** Despite breaking his ankle just before half term, George was captain of golf and squash, while also swimming for the school. He has qualified for the European Junior Championship in Cadiz and had led the College deeper into the National Schools cup than ever before. He was unbeaten on the squash court and had qualified for the National Swimming Championships.

Remembrance Sunday brought the CCF onto parade in front of the Memorial building. All Year 10 and 11 cadets were present. Of note was the fact that Sebastian Schmid got selected to march to the town memorial earlier in the day. Also **Corporal William Reeves**, **Lance Corporal Nicholas Siu** and **Cadet Oscar Baker** were selected to be flag bearers.



As always there is a full service program available to the pupils. In the CCF Year 11 members of A Company completed a challenging overnight field day in late September but they were not cowed by the elements. The RAF section were able to get some 'air experience flying' under their belts while the Navy section completed a day of water-based activities in the Eastbourne area. A small cohort of volunteers also learnt some new field-craft skills associated with working in a built-up area, including tunnelling and house clearances. Alongside the CCF, 125 members of the Lower Sixth have been involved in service activities this term. Sixth formers have been involved in a wide range of activities at the College and in the local community ranging from helping out at nurseries, care homes, hospices and charity shops. Away from these areas some have been recycling materials or picking up litter on the beach.

The Duke of Edinburgh award will be signing up new Year 10 pupils in January. I believe the College still produces more Gold Award winnings than anyone else in the county. It is certainly significant and an impressively run program. Currently Mingzhe Hu is pushing for his Gold Award, with Wilson Zhang currently working on his Silver.

Inter house sport

There has been lots of sporting competition this term starting with the Aquathlon on the first Thursday. September had barely begun and the same could be said for **Seb Schmid** and **Max Herrmanns** who threw themselves into the challenge and The Channel. Alongside them **George Pepper, Elliot Jones, Luke Clifford, Felix Griffin** and **Mingzhe Hu** ensured that Gonville had a senior and junior team. A very fine effort.

This was soon followed by the Steeplechase, the annual reminder that the South Downs are not insignificant. This year wristbands with GPS tracking brought the event into the 21st Century, much to the dismay of the serial corner-cutters! The sun shone once again and almost everyone in the house got out and took on the hills and cliffs. **Rupert Plumptre** was the top performer the senior category, **Tessen Von Heydebreck** the intermediate and **Magnus Chiu**, the junior.

House rugby, in the last week of term, had very different weather. Teams were playing Rugby X the new 5 or 6-a-side version of the game and it made for frenetic and even 7 minute games. In the Year 9 competition, shorn of talisman **William Daniels** by a concussion, the remaining seven lads stepped up and threw themselves into it. Strong carrying, big tackling and relentless energy saw them come back from a narrow loss to Reeves with a hearty thumping of Powell House. This set-up a semi final with Wargrave which proved a bridge too far, although a couple of late tries and a monster tackle from **Max Crowther** made sure they went back to Blackwater Road having been in a tussle. Special mention must go to **Oliver Du Feu** who proved to be a scoring machine and **Oliver Rose** who tackled everything that moved.

Year 10 were very dominant in the carry with **Elombe Case, Ed Rowell** and **Denziel Armah** very direct and **Luke Clifford** and **Zac Crowe** more elusive. In defence there was not the level of communication required and they allowed a few too many tries. A convincing win against Reeves was followed with a heart-breaking last second loss 4-3 to Powell. Then in the semi final the same thing happened against Pennell. The boys certainly deserved a spot in the final, but I was also proud of the fact that three of the squad had only started playing rugby 15 weeks before. The finalists picked their best six for the whole competition. Gonville were more inclusive and allowed anyone who wished to to have the experience of representing their house. In the long-run this will mean far more than that spot in the final.

The senior team was made up of an eclectic mix of teams: 1st, 2nd, 3rd and U16A all were represented and we had call ups for ex-players and recent beginners. There were few expecting Gonville to upset the apple cart and yet they stormed out of the blocks only just losing to pre-tournament favourites Craig, 2-1. Some huge tackles from **Chirag Gupta** and **Victor Chan** were allied to carrying from **Henry Drew** and subtlety from **James Nicholas**. A small squad and four games back to back meant that energy levels were very low for the finale against a Wargrave team. In the final act of his rugby career, Chirag managed to carry three men over the line to score the try to tie the scores and finish on a high.
