Oli Carter has represented the College in the first team in the three major sports; cricket, hockey and rugby. He also achieved full colours in all three sports. Such is his raw talent, he even took a year out of rugby and still started every game in the 1st XV in Year 13. Not only has he played in each sport he also received triple colours. If it wasn't for a clash he would have probably represented the school in football too, as he showed that he was one of the best footballers in the school during house football. He also won the house table tennis competition in Year 12.

Sam Williams has been one of the best youth windsurfers in the country. He has been crowned the 2019 UKWA coastal champion, having taken place in events at Stokes Bay in Hampshire, Christchurch, Weymouth in Dorset, Pwhelli in Wales and Bridlington, Yorkshire. Sam also won this series in 2018 so it meant a lot for him to carry this achievement into 2019.

This now concludes seven years of racing at Junior and Youth level for Sam as he has now turned 18. Winning his last race in challenging winds put a big smile on his face.

Over the past seven years he has won several national titles and been selected to rep-resent the British Sailing Team's National Junior and Youth Squad's for European and World Championships. In 2016 he was the London and South East Royal Yachting Association sailor of the year.
