Throughout the term, we've witnessed remarkable academic achievements and efforts that truly merit our collective recognition. Notably, Year 13 have been inundated with offers from their UCAS

applications, a testament to their hard work and dedication. They are now diligently working towards finalising their firm and insurance options, a crucial step before the 6th of June deadline.

In January, pupils in Year 11 sat their mock GCSE exams with a level of performance that bodes very well for the summer. The top performer in Reeves and one of the top performers in the College was Jonah Ripley, with an average score of 8.2. In February, the Year 13 boys sat their mock exams. The leading performer in the house was Isaac Ripley with grades of AAAC.

During the term we received results from the first round of the Physics Olympiad and congratulate Isaac Ripley and Ewan Clark on their awards.

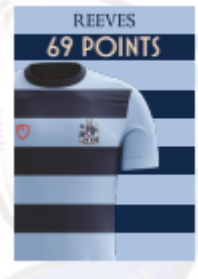
