### Service Review

A busy term for Duke of Edinburgh, with Y12 and Y10 Gonvillians attending their first training day on Sunday 23rd in preparation for their practice in the summer term. In the school, 70 pupils have completed the award over the last year - 22 golds, 47 silvers and 1 bronze. Congratulations to **Oliver Bearcroft, Heston Symonds** and **Oscar Fox** for completing gold and **Felix St John Parker** his silver.

Once again **Connor Morrell** has been the Gonville representative in the Charity Society, helping to organise events like the charity lunch and the Charity Revue. These and other events have raised in excess of £2500 for the Midlands Orphanage and Care Centre in Colenso, South Africa. In the charity revue, **Isaac Lee** performed a dance in collaboration with some Nugent girls. At the beginning of the term the Prefects put together a highly successful 'Eastbourne's Got Talent' event raising £879 for Blues Sky Bursaries. **Daniel Li** should be congratulated for making the final with his basketball skills.



The first Giving Day took place on 11th March, which raised many thousands of pounds for the Blue Sky Bursaries Appeal, aiming to fully-fund, means-tested bursary places at our school for local children. On the day the boys were tasked with creating a

mascot to parade down Old Wish Road followed by a house chant. There were junior and senior Tug O'War competitions. In the junior competition, Gonville lost in the final. A mixed year group team came second in the assault course, slowed up by the planks pictured. Throughout the day, the Gonville stall challenged pupils and staff to hang from a bar as long as possible.

All the houses had similar stands meaning that pupils could enjoy the carnival atmosphere and enjoy all ten stalls, including throwing sponges at staff.



Starting with hockey, the year 9 and 10 teams managed solid mid-table performances, but the senior side, while they enjoyed scoring goals against more illustrious rivals, especially the **Tom Robins** strike against Craig, they were not able to avoid a string of defeats, leaving us 6th overall. In the football, there was a memorable 2-0 win over Wargrave for the senior team, although I am ashamed to say that in all the excitement I can't be sure that Charl Spies and Alex Chapman scored the





goals. I do remember the wonderful strike from **Arnold Yan** to claim a 1-1 draw with Craig. Sadly the juniors suffered for lack of goals, but as always the endeavour was there. The house water polo saw the juniors miss out on the final by a hair's breadth in qualifying and then beat Reeves to claim 3rd place, with **Carlos Chan** scoring three goals. 




















































## House Pool Competition


